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

How to design channels so that principal and local councils can liaise

Part of the challenge with partnering towards a shared goal is that every relationship between councils is different.

Often, the role of individual relationships is essential in coordinating between liers. You often a member of staff leaving or a politician retiring results in partnerships withering away. Getting clear 'point people' in place, whose responsibility it is to liaise between the two, is therefore vital. Having individuals with set roles can help bridge the gap between principal and local levels.

In particular, a strong and flexible point person can help to cater to local councils' immensely varied levels of capacity, resource, and ability to navigate issues. It is no use relying on a single system or process; in a situation where one council is on the front foot and another needs to build its basic capacity, it is vital that there is a point of contact, or a single team to listee with.

There are many different ways of going about this, depending on the structures in place. In some instances, it may be that councillors can play bridging roles – especially if they are a councillor at both the principal and local council have roots in the community.

Including responsibility for local councils within a Cabinet portfolio at the principal council can be another effective way of creating direct channels and responsibilities. And other principal councils deploy parish liaison officer scheme, whereby each member of senior management has set roles. North Somerset council in particular has soloneered this.


Running alongside this, it is important for principal councils in areas with a number of town and parish councils to have dedicated officers or teams who hold responsibility for partnership. This helps to build capacity and realise potential in a more coordinated

However the channels for liaison are structured at a council, the important thing is to develop clear responsibilities and point people, who know the area sufficiently well that they can work with a range of different local partners.

Liaison

Parishes Advisory Group (PAG) – meets on average 6 weekly

Made up a set of parish councillors, a ward councillor, from each of the main parties, MKC link / liaison officers and the Cabinet Member (Chair) with responsibility for Economic Growth and Community Partnerships. Determines agenda for Parishes Forum and over recent times has been more involved with other issues i.e. the MKC parish conference in March 2017, joint working on approach for devolving services and assets, building on relationships, etc

Parish Forum - quarterly meeting

48 P&TC's invited to send 2 representatives - a meeting for the parishes. MKC link / liaison officers organise, administer and minute / arrange for speakers / officers to attend. Agenda determined by PAG

Ward Forums - frequency varies

Three Ward Forums – that we support.

- 1. Olney Organise and minute / arrange for speakers / officers
- 2. Danesborough Arrange for speakers / officers
- 3. Newport Pagnell and Hanslope No meetings in recent times, but happy to support if resurrected


MKALC – happy to attend if invited

Partnerships in action - devolving

Six 'devolved' landscape parishes in blace total (yellow) – agreements in place since 2014

- Landscaping services contract up for renewal / extension 2020
- Opportunity for parishes to take over delivery from 2020 (funded)
- Workshops, information, meetings, maps, funding, etc
- Twenty five parishes have expressed an interest in landscape service delivery (blue)
