Bathford Parish Council

Electorate: 1,440

Expenditure: £28,000

Bathford Parish Council has formulated plans to assist those that require to self-isolate due to COVID-19 Coronavirus. This will allow for groceries, pharmaceuticals and, other necessities to be delivered by volunteers to residents. The council is also working in collaboration with St. Swithun's Church to support lonely residents over the phone.

Freshford Parish Council is liaising with all local groups to coordinate activities. The council is helping to create a register of volunteers to assist vulnerable residents with day-to-day tasks. The council is supporting the village shop in serving the local community by setting up home delivery of food; supplies and, medicines.

Additionally, the council is using social media to update its community regularly around the coronavirus and social distancing. The town council has donated £500 to the local food bank to protect the most vulnerable residents.

Additionally, the Parish Council is using two mobile phones to assist residents.

One telephone number is being used as a day-to-day helpline, while the other mobile phone is being monitored overnight for people are in urgent need, such as they feel unwell and require someone to act on their behalf.

People requiring help contact the clerk, and their request is forwarded to the volunteer covering the area in which they live. It is offering to help with shopping, dog walking, friendly phone calls and medicine collection.

Yate Town Council is working with representatives of churches, neighbourhood watch groups, and the Facebook group followed by 2,500 residents wishing to assist vulnerable and isolated people during the crisis. The council is taking a coordinated approach to best benefit local people and has awarded the Foodbank an emergency grant of £4,000. Additionally, it has created an emergency grant fund of £4,500 to assist community groups affected by the coronavirus. The council has also donated leftover food from the closure of its cafés to the Foodbank and will be donating 750 Easter eggs it had planned to use for the annual Easter Egg Hunt, which is currently postponed. Over the Easter holiday, the council is also organising a virtual Easter bonnet competition via its Facebook webpage. Over the next couple of months, the council is aiming to support the most vulnerable in their town as well as providing activities and support to home educators.

Dunstable Town Council is providing emergency support to vulnerable households (food/prescription delivery etc) on behalf of Central Bedfordshire Council. The council is maintaining weekly contact with users of council run older peoples services (90+ residents) and providing necessary support. The council is also supporting the local voluntary effort to help vulnerable households (supporting Bedfordshire CVS, food banks and Bedfordshire Rural Community Council) and providing regular advice, guidance and service updates on social media platforms.

pharmacist, a man with a van). The council has also set up an emergency email address and telephone numbers and has distributed a leaflet to all households.

The council is trying to keep their website update with advice and regularly sends out newsletters to all residents on the council's email distribution list.

Over the last two or three weeks since lock down measures began to be put in place, Houghton Regis Town Council has been continuously trying to help residents in any way possible. This has included:

- Donation of essential supplies to care homes and housing schemes
- Donation of a food voucher to elderly people on the Mayors Christmas Card list
- Distribution of 600 Easter Eggs to local schools
- Offered help and assistance to existing local support groups including Houghton Regis Helpers and local churches
- Staff and councillors have signed up as Houghton Regis Helpers volunteers and are currently helping with shopping, prescription collection and befriending
- Distributed advice leaflets to vulnerable residents
- Councillors have signposted residents to find help and support regarding debt advice, rent / mortgage / utility payments, Universal Credit
- Our grounds team have also ensured areas of open space have been maintained

Kensworth Parish Council, Studham Parish Council and Whipsnade Parish Council have each used £250 from the chairs allowance to help support the Studham, Kensworth and Whipsnade Coronavirus Response Group (SKAW CRG). The group was established as a joint undertaking between Studham, Kensworth and Whipsnade Parish Councils along with the local Good Neighbour Schemes and churches to provide support to the vulnerable in the three councils' areas.

SKAW CRG is staffed, has single telephone and email contact details to ensure single point of contact arrangements and has been widely advertised in the three villages. As at 6 April, it had 137 volunteers and 99 people identified as in need of support. Volunteers are matched to support the vulnerable individually so that there is regular and trusted communication. Co-ordinated activities include grocery shopping, prescription collections from local pharmacies and surgeries and a newspaper delivery service for those in isolation who would otherwise consider collecting a paper from the newsagent.

Leighton-Linslade Town Council

Expenditure: £2,000,000

Leighton-Linslade Town Council is working in partnership with representatives from the community, homeless service, Scouts and Bedfordshire and Luton Emergency Volunteer Executive to form a COVID-19 Response Group for Leighton-Linslade. A Facebook page was started by two community volunteers and now has a membership of almost 2000, with many members offering help and support to others. The council has lent the group a vehicle and a phone has

provided lanyards and T-shirts for volunteers to use for ID and, has provided storage for dry goods. The task force has delivered food parcels to those in desperate need and is working with local businesses to establish and promote home delivery services, particularly for food. Although most staff are now home working, the council is continuing to offer all the support it can.

Sharnbrook Parish Council

Electorate: 1,710

Expenditure: £110,000

Local stakeholders and residents, including the chairman of Sharnbrook Parish Council, have set up a group called Sharing in Sharnbrook. They have leafletted every household, got 50 willing volunteers and are doing all sorts, from walking people's dogs to collecting prescriptions, phoning for a chat, giving advice and picking up shopping. Sharnbrook Parish Council has set up a dedicated phone line, with a rota for managing the phone and a dedicated email with the same person checking and allocating someone to action email requests. There is a linked Facebook Page, and people are also using the "Nextdoor" app to make requests which are passed to this service.

The Clerk and councillors are coordinating existing volunteer groups and new volunteers to provide a service to the vulnerable by collecting medications, groceries, dog walking and just talking to those who feel isolated.

Stanbridge Parish Council

Expenditure: £31,400

In response to the Coronavirus crisis, Stanbridge Parish Council initiated a Stanbridge Community Response Group. The council purchased a mobile phone and leafleted each house with the number asking for volunteers and if anyone required assistance with tasks including shopping, getting prescriptions and walking their dog.

A dedicated volunteer website was set up in order to hold data and enable call handlers to quickly look up details in order to assign tasks. This also contains useful documents where the call handlers have access to a wealth of information and advice which they can relay to callers over the phone and also email to callers as required. As of 9th April, the group has 19 volunteers registered and 3 residents requesting assistance. These numbers are expected to grow in the coming weeks.

St John the Baptist Church has also identified residents in need and is assisting them. Stanbridge Parish Council has offered additional financial assistance if required and the church has also received funding from individuals who are showing their generosity. These funds are being used initially for a food bank.

More than twenty volunteers have signed up to help those who need to self-isolate with tasks including shopping and collecting prescriptions. Volunteers carry out day-to-day activities such as picking up groceries; dropping off and collecting prescriptions; dog walking if you can't leave the house; running errands (post office/banking) or visit or call you on the phone for a chat. The Emergency Response Team is aiming to protect their community through the tasks of volunteers.

Pangbourne Parish Council has set up a community volunteer scheme, in partnership with the local churches, doctor's surgery and residents. It closely follows the national "hello neighbour" approach. The Parish Council has been able to put in place safeguarding measures and ensure that all areas of the village community are covered.

Pangbourne Parish Council has recruited more than 100 volunteers within a few days that are now up and running; collecting shopping and, prescriptions for members of the community. The council has worked closely with the local doctor's surgery to help support them and their patients at this time and are continuing to work with West Berkshire District Council as they move forward with setting up their central Hub.

Quainton Parish Council has set up a volunteer emergency team and has now over 60 members. These volunteers act as 'street wardens' and are the point of contact for neighbours and those close by who need help should they be self-isolating or fall into the elderly or vulnerable group. This can entail delivering prescriptions; food; fuel or just be available for a chat. The council is working alongside the village store and pub to advertise a takeaway service or deliver orders to people's homes. They are using social media to communicate email alert lists; the village website; the village newsletter and Facebook.

The group has set up a dedicated telephone number and email address to assist residents in need. The request for help is then allocated to a volunteer, who makes contact with the service user and complete the request.

Woughton Community Council

Woughton Community Council were well placed to respond to the current crisis – they closed their offices on 17th March, providing all staff with an integrated IT and communications system that works from home. This enabled the council to continue to deliver essential services remotely, with reception continuing to transfer incoming calls to the relevant officers / members, utilising online meeting facilities to maintain regular contact. With a robust scheme of delegation in place, Emergency Incident Planning was implemented, ensuring that urgent matters continued to be dealt with, whilst also working with a range of partners across the voluntary, statutory and private sector to commence additional works.

This has included:

- The creation of an estate-based link with workers, coordinating knowledge and volunteers within geographic areas, reducing the need to travel.
- The provision of online forms to enable people to register their needs (either directly or via officers completing via phone calls), linked to the delivery of essential services.
- The provision of emergency food parcels to those most in need, alongside other deliveries where essential (for example, prescriptions).
- The continuation of advice and wellbeing services, using email; phone; Skype and similar, to ensure needs are met.
- An emergency grant programme implemented to enable the community groups that are providing direct support to access much-needed funding.
- Creation of online support and services, with everything from a dedicated web page covering daily updates, support services, online activities and how to stay safe online.
- Youth services are creating new responses, including online youth clubs, video content for members of the dance sessions and a series of updates keeping young people engaged and involved.
- The creation and delivery of a resource pack to every house in the parish to enable everyone to have knowledge of and access to the support needed.

The local volunteers have arranged a door-to-door prescription delivery service. The council has published their village newsletter, which is delivered to each household, to publicise the details of the volunteering scheme. The volunteers are also organising the collection and redistribution of unused laptops, to support those who are home schooling.

Cottenham Parish Council, organised 140 volunteers who are performing tasks such as shopping, collecting prescriptions and making friendly phone calls. Through the General Power of Competence, the council is using its website, which has been modified to become a pre-payment shopping system, in conjunction with the local Co-op store, to allow volunteers to multi-buy for residents. For elderly residents unable to use that system, the council is using a Monzo card which can be used by the volunteers to pay for the shopping directly.

Godmanchester Town Council, in conjunction with the Godmanchester COVID-19 Mutual Aid Group and the Community Association Timebank, has set up a town-wide local support network operating via over 100 volunteers. Over 60 of these are acting as street coordinators and have put themselves in contact with the other local households to handle requests for assistance with shopping, prescription collection, and transport to surgeries - or to simply provide advice and a friendly voice.

Haslington Parish Council has set up an emergency support group, with one councillor volunteering to take on the role of emergency support officer. In this role they work with village wardens, car schemes and the lunch club to identify vulnerable and elderly residents. Up to 50 residents have volunteered to help operate the plan. The volunteers have split into five hubs and each hub has a co-ordinator to ensure all the identified residents are allocated a volunteer. We use WhatsApp to communicate with each Hub. Notices of help were posted on the village website and Facebook pages.

Shoppers are required to phone or email the council their orders to the shop and pay over the phone. A volunteer will then collect the shopping orders and deliver to residents.

Longstanton Parish Council has the support of over 110 volunteers who have agreed to give up some time to support vulnerable residents during the outbreak. Every dwelling in the parish received a leaflet from the council providing telephone and email contact details for residents to use when they need support. Tasks mainly include: collecting shopping, collecting prescriptions and telephone support. On top of this, the district council has provided a list of over 240

residents who may need additional support. The clerk has emailed, telephoned and/or written to all of them to ensure they are aware of the support available.

Bridport Town Council has created and led a partnership of over 20 local organisations and community groups, supported by over 170 volunteers, to provide an integrated support network for the most vulnerable in the community. A dedicated helpline phone number provides a single point of access to organisations and volunteers who can help with:

- Supply and delivery of food and groceries, whether or not the person can pay
- Help with medical and clinical concerns, including collection and delivery of prescriptions
- Wellbeing support, including mental health crisis support, regular checks on vulnerable people, or an informal chat
- Signposting to other sources of help and support;
- A directory of local groups and businesses offering help; and
- Access to 'troubleshooting' volunteers to find solutions to other practical problems faced by residents

Since its launch on 1 April the Bridport Coronavirus Community Support Helpline has received 635 calls (as at 28 April) and an estimated further 300 email requests. A supporting leaflet promoting the helpline has been distributed to 11,500 households in the area, extending into parishes well beyond Bridport. A postcard has been distributed to supermarkets, medical centre, pharmacies, etc. to encourage the vulnerable to use the available services and allow them to stay

at home. A Facebook page allows those with online access to post queries and requests, and a dedicated web page at has been set up.

Broadmayne Parish Council has an emergency plan which covers pandemics. The plan was activated and the community emergency response team was convened. Before lock-down a leaflet drop was made to all households explaining what services would be offered (shopping/prescription delivery/dog walking/counselling) to those unable to leave home and asking for volunteers. Key volunteers with particular skills or resources were already identified in the plan and over 70 volunteers were found. The village was divided into sectors each with a team leader, and a coordinator takes all initial calls and passes to the relevant team leader who allocates the task. The system has been helped enormously by the cooperation of the village shop which has developed a distance payment system to avoid the volunteer having to handle money. The council has a dedicated page on the community website which explains the support plan and provides links to many other websites providing support and information on the emergency.

Weymouth Town Council covers several communities which include town centres, small villages and urban housing areas. As such, the council has taken a coordinating role, ensuring that the existing community groups and new ones can get their services to local people. The council set up a dedicated website, promoted on social media, the press and local radio. The page has assistance and links to businesses, including businesses who deliver. The council has worked directly with a local charity, Refresh, to set up a project covering all areas of Weymouth. The Keep In Touch project offers shopping and medication delivery, financial assistance and a friendly ear. The council's staff is supporting the project organisation, in addition to delivering shopping and medication. The council has worked with Refresh to produce a postcard detailing all the support available including foodbanks, shopping support, medication delivery and health advice.

The council and community volunteers have delivered 15,000 leaflets. The leaflets targeted areas the council know there is a low internet usage as Weymouth has some of the most relatively deprived areas in Dorset and some of the lowest social mobility scores in the south of England.

Councillors agreed that the town clerk would administer £ 7,000 fund to support local groups that provide services to vulnerable residents — £5,000 has been allocated. The council's cleaning staff with reduced workloads due to the closure of public toilets have been supporting the local marina in keeping facilities open for those people currently living on their boats. It has provided the council with some income while projecting significant losses in the coming months.

In the early days of the pandemic, Stanley Town Council were part of a group set up with the Durham County Council Area Action Partnership, ADVICE in County Durham, and local voluntary sector organisation. As things were changing rapidly,

they would have a daily conference call to discuss issues and service delivery in the community, and to ensure any gaps were quickly identified and plans put in place to fill these gaps.

As a town council, they made the decision early to set up a community support fund. This budget was allocated to over 22 groups and organisations within the town, to help them with support work and to ensure they they survived the crisis and were in a position to help support the towns recovery as the country comes out of lockdown.

Once the crisis started to take effect, the council closed the Civic Hall to the public. One of the local foodbanks had to close its operations due to their volunteers all being of an age where they had to self-isolate. Subsequently the council worked with a partner community organisation, PACT House, to reopen part of the Civic Hall to allow the foodbank to reopen and operate out of the building. The PACT House team also relocated to the Civic Hall and has continued to operate combined foodbank services, as well as the coronavirus support service from the building. To date they have dealt with in excess of 2,000 enquiries/calls.

As well as the services at the Civic Hall, and with PACT House, another of the council's community centres also developed their existing foodbank/advice service to include additional isolation support services, and they are currently running at over 1,250 calls.

All these village hall/community centres received funding from the council's community support grant.

In addition to the foodbank and isolation support services the council has supported two other local voluntary organisations:

- SHAID (Single Homeless Action Initiative Durham) who provide support to homeless people in the town
- Just For Women, a local charity and voluntary organisation who support women suffering/surviving domestic violence

The council is now working with partners on how to help the town recover and move forward from the crisis.

Andrew Tubb, chief executive officer, said: “These are extremely concerning and worrying times for everyone in our community; local councils across the country have a role of community leadership in reaching out to ensure that people feel safe and can access support.”

Initially, the council's main priority was to ensure continuous operation with respect to decision making and delivering services and support. It already had robust contingency measures using cloud-based information technology so that staff can work remotely via the internet. Then, within its Standing Orders, there is a contingency for decision making and expenditure to be delegated to the chief executive officer in consultation with the chairman of the council and its corporate group of lead members. In addition, it has a wide range of segregated duties and responsibilities.

It is vital at this time that staff who are working remotely can still interact with others in the team, and they have established a WhatsApp group for staff to keep in social contact. In terms of its wider communication and service delivery, it is working in shift patterns to ensure, as far as possible, that services can continue. It has closed its main offices and meeting spaces, so its communication with the public is now primarily via social media and its website, as well as local noticeboards across the town. It is re-tweeting trustworthy sources of information and keeping in regular contact with key partners across the town, such as the district council, taking the lead on advice and working together to support the community. It will next explore options for making available an emergency fund for local charities.

They have publicised and set up delivery services for fresh food for residents. The council is publicising revised opening hours for their nearest community shop.

The council is revamping its cohort of community volunteers who operate a telephone system to keep in touch with parishioners, but in particular, the vulnerable individuals in the community. Their communication system is designed to ensure that no person is left out. Many of the older residents do not use the internet or applications such as WhatsApp. The WhatsApp groups that have been set up are being used by family members who may live at distance from older relatives to maintain links with people in our community to ensure their loved ones are safe.

The council has encouraged local volunteer groups to work with them to set up 'The New Alresford Support Network' for residents. They printed 3000 leaflets and delivered them to each household in the town and those that were just on the borders. They also set up a dedicated email and telephone line which is manned daily from 8am to 8pm by council staff, councillors and volunteers.

The system the council has put in place is a tiered system with a clear line of management and consists of the following:

- Team leaders
- Street coordinators
- Street volunteers

The town has been divided into sectors and each team leader assigned a sector. Within each sector there are a number of streets and each street has a dedicated street coordinator. The street coordinator is responsible for all volunteers in their street.

The street coordinators are the core of the New Alresford Support Network and were issued with 'postcards' to deliver to each household in their street containing their personal contact details. Any resident can contact their street coordinator with a request and the street coordinator assigns a street volunteer to the task. The team leaders are in constant communication with their street coordinators who in turn are in constant communication with their street volunteers. New Alresford Town Council has issued guidance to street volunteers and street coordinators, including health and safety guidance. They will be publishing their first newsletter to street coordinators. The council has just launched a befriending service to be included in the support network and is supporting a local hardship fund for residents.

Volunteer coordinators have been provided with identity badges. This scheme is constantly under review, and more flyers will be distributed with further information as and when needed.

Information has also been provided in the local village newsletter and on the council website. The council has been working with a local farm to provide free fruit to those in need. A WhatsApp and email group has been set up for the volunteer co-ordinators. Extra volunteers have been drafted in to keep the community shop open. The parish council has also been working with Maidstone Borough Council's Hub and the community warden.

HCSG comprises three groups: a body of volunteers supported by a central co-ordination group, and a reference group. The reference group is chaired by the chairman of Hawkhurst Parish Council and provides oversight. Members of the co-ordination group have shared access to an online database, which is automatically populated when help is requested or offered through an online form. This form can be accessed from links on the community social media pages and also directly from the HCSG website.

The support group has a virtual phone number so that they can provide one central number. In addition, volunteers delivered a flyer to every house in the parish. The support group received a number of offers to help. HCSG's operating procedures/plan was written by a resident with experience in emergency planning and the online system was created by another resident.

HCSG is currently providing support in terms of shopping, collecting prescriptions and dog walking, and a phone buddy system is being set up. At the time of writing over 180 residents had offered their help as volunteers, more than 100 volunteers had been reference checked and provided with their volunteer ID badge and more than 70 households had signed up for support. The support group website contains information on keeping safe, links to guidance on mental health and wellbeing, information on local shops opening times and delivery services, as well as links to other support groups in neighbouring areas.

Local businesses have been doing their bit too. The Store Managers of Tesco and Waitrose are also on the reference group, supporting the group in getting food and supplies to vulnerable residents. The village butcher, Park Farm Butchers, has generously offered the use of their van for deliveries. A local farm, Stevens Farm, provided the group with a bag of apples for every single household being supported by the group.

The Reference Group had its first meeting on Thursday 2nd April, which was extremely valuable. A common concern shared by the representatives from the Parish Council, HCSG, the medical practice and the supermarkets was the number of elderly and vulnerable people who are still out and about in the village, putting themselves at unnecessary risk. A joint effort has been introduced to tackle this. HCSG created a new design for flyers and posters specifically aimed at vulnerable residents. By the end of Friday, A1 posters were on display in the supermarkets, the pharmacy and the medical practice. The pharmacy and medical practice are distributing the flyers with prescriptions. Supermarket staff are handing the flyers out to their vulnerable customers.

At the beginning of March, Broughton Astley Parish Council's parish manager, Debbie Barber, approached the chair of the council, Clive Grafton-Reed, stating that a response for the Covid-19 pandemic would be needed in the village. The

next day Mark Barber, Debbie's husband, sent out an appeal on social media for volunteers to come forward. Mark also undertook the task as co-ordinator of the volunteer group.

A telephone number was published for anyone needing help or assistance to call.

The parish council met and passed an emergency motion to make funding and resources immediately available to support the volunteer group.

An A4 poster was produced giving details of the group which was delivered to every shop in the village to display and over the weekend one of the parish councillors created an A5 leaflet from the poster which was to go out to all households in the village giving details of what the volunteer group could offer in the way of services.

The single telephone help line number was replaced by a central free phone number enabling multiple calls to be handled at any one time and to take calls out of hours. At the same time, the parish manager obtained a dedicated email address for the group.

The telephone number and dedicated email address were added to the leaflet and sent to a local printer to produce. 5000 leaflets were then distributed by the village's running group to every household by the end of the week. This information was also published on the parish council's website and other social media pages. A Facebook group was set up and became available to any Broughton Astley resident who wanted to join.

Following this the group also registered the group details with Covid-19 Mutual Aid UK, enabling the group to be identified by anyone searching the site for their local group.

As the calls for help came in a dedicated volunteer was assigned to an individual. The volunteers were cross checked by the parish office that they were indeed residents of the village from the electoral register, they were asked to provide photographic evidence such as a passport or driving licence, and then a photo ID lanyard was produced along with a unique reference number.

With the virus spreading, the pharmacy's delivery service lost its normal drivers and so BAVG stepped in to provide a delivery service to people getting their prescriptions from the pharmacy in Broughton Astley.

BAVG's range of services includes:

- A dedicated shopper for those in isolation
- A prescription collection / delivery service in Broughton Astley and surrounding villages
- Dog walking

- Friendly phone calls organised by the Reverend Sharon Constable.
- Mobile banking – a mobile card reader allowing cash to be obtained via the client's debit card
- Food bank collection point
- Posting of letters and parcels
- Top up of gas and electric cards.
- Meat deliveries from the local butcher.
- Newspaper deliveries
- Arranging emergency tradesmen for domestic repairs.
- Grass cutting and gardening.

At the time of writing BAVG have assisted 179 households with shopping, delivered over 1265 prescriptions, arranged on average 10 medication requests per week direct to the doctors, organised over £1,700 credit or debit card payments for either cash or payment for shopping, delivered approximately 140 kilos of food weekly to the local food bank, organised emergency repairs for isolated residents and assisted the local butcher delivering in and around the village.

At a very early stage (on 16 March) Councillor Jeremy Rowe united a small group of local people, including representatives from Chedgrave, Loddon and Hales and Heckingham Parish Councils' and South Norfolk District Council's Early Help Hub. The group produced 4,000 leaflets providing clear advice and containing contact details for help and support, which were then distributed to every home across the area, as well as being given out at strategic points locally.

The group set up a WhatsApp group, which very quickly contained 80 local volunteers, keen to support the community. The Early Help Hub, as a key contact point for support, posts urgent requirements on the WhatsApp group, including requests for help with:

- Delivering prescriptions - hundreds already having been delivered
- Carrying out local shopping
- Providing supportive phone calls

- Running a rota at the local Boots chemist, opening the door to customers and taking prescription details, thereby significantly speeding up the issuing of medicines
- Picking and distributing food parcels provided by Morrison's

'Cromer Cares' was set up by Cromer Town Council in mid-March. Julie Chance and Janet Warner, as Cromer's clerk and deputy clerk, have been coordinating efforts since then, working closely with Cllr Tim Adams. This has involved directly organising the supply of food and services to residents vulnerable due to their social care needs, illness, housing issues or addiction. They are also supporting people who either have very limited means, or who had existing arrears and debts, who haven't yet received furlough pay, have had unexpected bills, or with other financial pressures. They have worked with over two hundred volunteers and helped over 1,100 households in Cromer and the ten surrounding villages. They have assisted with befriending, newspaper collections, transport to medical appointments, all sorts of advice and with facilitating access to other services.

The council scheduled an extraordinary meeting as soon as the council realised the seriousness of the virus and the impact it may have on the community. At the meeting, the council invited Dr Hayward, a retired GP in East Harling. Dr Hayward advised the council on the impact of this virus and gave guidance on how to establish an emergency assistance plan. Kate Filby, town clerk, was given full powers to act on behalf of the council and a grant of £2,000 from Harling Combined Trust was made available. A day-to-day example of the council's work can be seen below:

- 19 March — the clerk met Dr Hayward and three councillors to put in place the basis of the assistance plan. The clerk designed a leaflet for distribution, and a mobile phone was purchased.
- 20 March — the clerk met with four members of the council to break the village down into four zones. One thousand two hundred leaflets went to print, and the ID card was designed. A volunteer information sheet with health and safety notes was put in place, and a call out for volunteers was circulated.
- 21 March — the village hall opened up for volunteers to come along, be designated to a councillor and a zone, details taken and ID cards distributed. Leaflets were given to volunteers for delivery. Over 1,000 households received leaflets by the end of the weekend. Extra leaflets were left in the local shops. Details of the emergency helpline were advertised on the notice board, village Facebook page and emailed out to over 40 residents. Dr Hayward was present to speak on general COVID-19 concerns. At the end of the morning, the council had signed up over 60 volunteers. All volunteers received £50 to cover any purchasing costs should a resident not have any money to hand.

The council also adhered to government guidelines regarding safety and made handwash stations available. Councillors reminded to wash hands regularly, 2-meter distance adhered to, one entrance in and a separate exit opened up. The emergency phone line has over 80 volunteers working on a rota system and have taken over 120 calls. Mainly for shopping and picking up prescriptions but also for dog walking. The village Facebook page is updated regularly.

As early as mid-March, Deddington and Parish Covid-19 Response Team swung into action. The initiative came from residents and had the active support of both Deddington Parish Council and the parish church. The parish was divided into 12 zones, each with a captain and a team of volunteers. An instant service was set up to help anyone self-isolating by having supplies and medications delivered, dogs walked – or hearing a friendly voice on the end of a phone. The response team rapidly identified the most vulnerable in the parish and took special care that no one was left without support.

The main means of communication is a weekly newsletter, printed and delivered to the 2000 or so residents, and also posted online on the various community

group social media sites. Extra care is taken to reach those people without access to smartphone, tablet or computer.

By the fifth week of the lockdown volunteers had made 375 shopping trips for 82 parishioners, collected 71 prescriptions for 33 people, telephoned 20 residents for a chat on 102 occasions and delivered 5000 newsletters plus various other errands. What became apparent was that they were successfully meeting the demand for practical support but there was a need for more mental health and wellbeing action.

To meet this need, Deddington Parish Council created a second version of the newsletter which focused more on professional support services. The council also asked the community an open question about the support that was needed. They are aiming to contact all age groups and ensure that those who are not online can get in touch.

The council plans to encourage providers of group activities in the parish to move to virtual platforms that also support those who want to telephone in to listen or participate.

Nearly 30% of residents in Church Stretton are over 70 years of age, so most of the existing volunteers are in that age bracket. However, the Mayfair Community Centre has 100 volunteers under 70 years of age and is developing support regimes for the 150 known vulnerable adults in the community. Good Neighbours has 16 of its 58 drivers who are under the age of 70, but the meals service is expanding. Mayfair is working with a local shopping service, aided by the council grant to grow a supported shopping service for those in need and without support. It involves bulk purchasing from the local supermarket and shopping being packed and delivered by volunteers.

Longer-term, developing a digital system to link offers of help and demands through emails which are connected to the council website, to ease the pressure on the current phone-call system. The council has closed its buildings except for its public toilets, cleaned daily. For this week at least, the Thursday market remains open, with the strict injunction to queue two metres apart. This decision will be subject to review. The council regularly updates its website with links through to a separate website to publicise the ever-increasing number of free delivery/takeaway offers from local shops, eateries and pubs.

The challenge remains of how to support the vulnerable elderly and children in villages across a vast rural area, especially after the school closures. Shropshire Council is developing a system of community hubs in market towns to begin addressing this need. Shropshire Council plans to delay council tax payments and provide grants for charities to build support services, plus possible bus subsidies.

The group now has over 150 volunteers and over 100 registered members and is growing daily. The volunteers offer help with many activities, including shopping, prescription collections, and a friendly voice on the phone for those who want a chat. A website, a dedicated phone line and a cash-free payment system have been set up. The council has supported the group with a start-up grant of £5,000, which as well as supporting the day-to-day running of the scheme, has allowed a food bank to be set up for those in desperate need. Those struggling financially will be given a food parcel of essential items.

The council can continue its day-to-day work as much as possible through a scheme of delegation to the clerk, and virtual meetings for any urgent issues that cannot be dealt with under the delegation.

The council have also been liaising with the principal authority and local housing groups to raise awareness of the Eccleshall Cares support group, and promotion via social media and its website. The council has also created a list of local businesses on its website that are still able to offer services in line with social distancing guidance.

The council chair has been in touch with users of the local Voluntary Car Scheme (a separate community venture) to check if any users need support and to signpost them to the Eccleshall Cares group.

Madeley Parish Council held an extraordinary general meeting on 20 March and decided to create a task force to deal with the fallout that is being caused by the coronavirus. The task force initially involved four councillors as well as a representative of a local charity, The Madeley and District Community Association, and representatives from the Madeley Centre (a local hub).

The council have within a week expanded its local partners and is working closely with the local retailers. They provide essential services as well as the doctor's surgery, schools, various food banks, the Church and other vital local providers such as farmers. It is an immense task which has swallowed up an enormous amount of time but is, already, starting to yield significant benefits to the community.

The first service that the council provided its residents was collating all services under one roof and ensuring that residents are aware of this by promoting on social media and other avenues. Additionally, changes and issues that are occurring locally such as modifications to shop timetables, post office opening hours and foodbank availability.

The council has identified both through itself and local institutions a number of the most vulnerable in society and, in only five days since the plan came together, have provided them with essential shopping and medication. The principal authority is now signposting people to the council when they receive enquiries in Madeley, as well as the doctor's surgery.

The next step is to tie this plan down into something more manageable. The council will be putting together essentials boxes to provide to vulnerable people. By collating key items, it will save time from dealing with several shopping lists. The council is directing those who can do it themselves to provide fresh food

(fruit and veg) that can be delivered. The council helps those in need who don't feel able to sort their fruit and veg through the process of ordering it — small butcher items to the boxes as necessary.

The council is in conversation with the Shaw Education Trust who have two schools in the parish, intending to co-ordinate food bank provisions through the central hub that is the Madeley Centre. Hopefully, that will develop as it will provide all children who are eligible for free school meals with additional food.

The councils plan to provide an extension to its telephone hotline to help people have a voice on the end of the phone when they are isolated and to provide them with emotional support. The council are also working on providing financial guidance on what support may be available to people so that they can signpost them on to the relevant channels and help them with any difficulties they may encounter with those services.

Bungay Town Council is organising two banks of volunteers who are manning a free phone system and a collection and delivery shopping service. The telephone service operates between 8-8 o'clock, seven days a week. Again this is a considerable task as they have organised 12 volunteers per day. The 0300 free phone number, will provide advice and guidance on a range of issues, such as directing individuals to the appropriate bodies (such as Waveney Foodbank, CAB, emergency helplines, medical services, shops, meal deliveries); arranging a collection service (for prescriptions and pre-paid goods.) and, to carry out emergency shopping for individuals who can pay, but have no access to cash and don't pay for goods online.

To help this specific group, funds have been raised to enable the town council to shop for the residents and invoice them for the goods, with payment to be made to the town council once restrictions have been lifted. As an aside, for those currently in dire need of food supplies, the Waveney Foodbank is now offering a service where residents can turn up at the foodbank without needing referral and, also, there is a freephone number that residents can ring if they need to have an emergency package of food delivered directly to them.

Framlingham Town Council has prepared a plan to provide a town-wide response to COVID-19 in Framlingham. Their objective is to put in place structures to support the community over the coming months.

The plan has four main elements:

1. The council has set up a coordination centre in the council offices, in the library and will coordinate information and action across the town. It will also link with the emergency services and agencies at the county level.

2. The council is establishing neighbourhood 'cocoon' groups across the town, which will be composed of ten to 20 households. The idea is that neighbours can support each other to make sure that nobody is left isolated without support, food or medical care. Communication within the cocoons can be done by telephone or through the internet.

The town will be divided into ten administrative areas, each will have an area co-ordinator. They will link to the co-ordination centre and will allow the council to pass information to support is directed where it is needed.

3. The council is establishing a capability to supply food and medical supplies to isolated and vulnerable people. They are looking to be able to supply 'meals on wheels'; food shopping and, prescriptions.

4. The council is working with Framlingham's Churches and other community groups to ensure that there is social and spiritual support for residents. Using telephones and social media we will provide support to the community.

In alliance with Maresfield Parish Council, the Nutley Coronavirus Support Group has been set up to support the vulnerable people around Nutley, Maresfield and Fairwap. The support group assists residents who find themselves with limited contact due to Covid-19. The group aims to provide a free service for its community by listening, supporting and helping the vulnerable where they can. This service includes helping with tasks such as shopping, collecting medication and spending time with and talking to isolated people.

The Nutley Coronavirus Support Group will help residents who feel isolated by organising telephone calls between volunteers and vulnerable residents. Alternatively, if residents need assistance, the council will signpost to relevant help. This assistance includes: driving people to the hospital or doctor's appointments, collecting medication prescriptions, picking up shopping and essentials, or collecting information on local resources. The council is also highlighting the green spaces nearby, such as the South Downs National Park. Exercising and socialising with people in green spaces will help to overcome isolation and loneliness.

A number of the volunteers have already been CRB check and are First Aid trained. Plaistow and Ifold Parish Council clerk Catherine Nutting, alongside her council, set up a Local Community Action Volunteering (LCAV) Scheme. This scheme has put a policy in place for residents to follow if they require assistance with day-to-day tasks.

The LCAV policy outlines the need for GDPR consent for things such as collecting drug prescriptions and advocates online payments to stop the residents from getting targeted. A letter was given out at the local church and at community hotspots to encourage residents to use the scheme. The letters urged residents to do what they can and foster a relationship between the service user and the volunteer. At the moment, the scheme is assisting six vulnerable people and supporting 24 volunteers.

The LCAV Scheme and policy has been shared with the Surrey and Sussex Association of Local Councils so it can be passed on to its members. This scheme ultimately encourages community partnerships and cultivates relationships among those who are vulnerable in the parish and those who are more able. It is essential to support the vulnerable to restrain the effects of social isolation and loneliness.

On March 20 2020, Bidford on Avon Parish Council agreed measures to ensure its residents, especially the vulnerable and housebound, could be kept supplied with medicine, food and other staple supplies. The council put out a call for volunteers, and reached an agreement with the local supermarket so that residents could phone or email their orders three mornings a week. Orders would then be delivered by council registered volunteers. To safeguard volunteers there is no face to face contact, no money changes hands and all deliveries are left at the door. Residents who are on benefits and unable to place orders as they are "cash only" are being asked to contact the council office, as the council has set up a scheme with Warner's Budgens to assist them and ensure they are able to be supplied with food and other essentials. To date, over a 1,000 deliveries have been made. Bidford Health Centre and Bidford Pharmacy have also been advised to contact the Parish Council for assistance in the delivery of prescriptions.

The situation is very fluid and Bidford Parish Council will endeavour to keep up with the changes and do all it can to ensure the safety and well-being of its community.

Harbury Parish Council immediately responded to the coronavirus pandemic, surveying all houses within the parish via leaflets. This established whether a household was self-isolating through symptoms, illness or age, or was willing to volunteer to help those who were. Harbury has been divided into eight zones, each with its own volunteer coordinator who matches volunteers with those needing help. Volunteers check in with their houses each day to see how they are, what they need or to provide a friendly ear. They then help to collect medication, shopping, top up phones, swap library books or pay bills. This effort is coordinated by the council chairman, with the chairman and volunteer coordinators meeting every week to review progress and share experiences.

The group also organised a volunteer rota to staff the supermarket when the owners became ill, enabling this valuable village resource to remain open.

When the emergency started it was recognised that, because of the older average age of their local population, Wilsden Parish Council would have a significant number of residents who needed to socially isolate. Before the lockdown started a number of local volunteers came forward looking for ways to help. The parish council provided a framework to enable an effective network of volunteers to be established. Early in the crisis, a leaflet was delivered to every household in the parish. This offered help with shopping; collecting prescriptions and other needs as they arose. Wilsden Parish Council also recognised that loneliness was likely to be an issue which could worsen as time went on. The council already had contact with some of the most vulnerable residents, through their community car scheme whose co-ordinator made sure that those who needed help had access to it. Wilsden Parish Council are using both social media and word of mouth to identify others in need of support.

Once Bradford District Council had set up its own resources and volunteer network, those residents in the parish who applied through the District Council's central telephone line were channelled into our Wilsden Parish Council's scheme. Wilsden Village Hall was established as a Neighbourhood Service Centre linked to the Ward Hub through which resources and key services, including financial support and more specialised advice from Bradford Council, can be accessed. Wilsden Coronavirus Volunteers now has around 50 volunteers supporting nearly 100 households in the area. Volunteers are advised to limit their exposure to public places by doing shopping for the housebound at the same time as their own, and the number of visits to the pharmacy are greatly reduced by having two volunteers dedicated entirely to daily prescription delivery.
